Why talk about race?

"It's a relevant topic and we're living in a world where disparities need to be addressed," says Raymond Lee, a 2017 Mayor's Youth Council member. "When you predetermine who a person is just by their appearance, you limit the possibilities of all the things they can do." Every year the Mayor's Youth Council organizes KidSpeak® – an event where young people give testimony to elected officials and community leaders. They chose race as their topic given the recent national elections and the Mayor's equity agenda. The questions raised were: What do you think about race? How does it affect you? Is Grand Rapids a tale of two cities? How can all children be successful regardless of race?





