GREAT OUTCOMES FOR CHILDREN Invest in Afterschool!


Afterschool programs have a significant impact on children's outcomes. The Expanded Learning Opportunities (ELO) Network of over 60 organizations agreed on success measures and then tracked its collective impact. Children who participate often in afterschool programs attend school at higher rates and do not get in trouble in the community. We also found that the majority of children being served in our ELO Network are those most in need! 48% (*\$270,265) of total budget is allocated back to community partners. All grants leverage 2-3 times their amounts in community contributions.

TCTC Center in the Works to Support Grand Rapids Students!

A strong and thriving city is one that builds on the talents and strengths of all residents. The more our city residents have college degrees, the greater our talent pool for innovation and growth ensuring a brighter future for all. Yet too many of our own city youth are finding a college degree beyond their grasp.

In response, Our Community's Children facilitates the 'To College, Through College' Initiative, a collaboration of higher education, non-profits, foundations and businesses. Building on best practices, they are filling the gap of student need and developing a community-based response to ensure all persons, particularly first generation college students and persons of color, get a degree. Mayor Heartwell's farewell legacy raised funds for a center specifically geared towards helping students sort through the complex maze of college support. This center will be based at the Grand Rapids Public Library with satellite sites for outreach. The Center is expected to open in Summer of 2016!
